

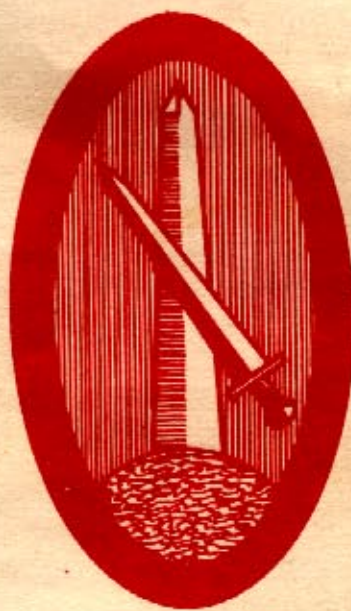

By 1985 there will be another 43 million people in the U.S., for a total of over 240 million, according to Census Bureau forecasts.

Most of this population growth will take place in 17 states, the CB says.

These states and their projected growth rates are Florida (61 percent), Arizona (58 percent), California and Nevada (51 percent), New Mexico (42 percent), Utah and Delaware (33 percent), Colorado and Maryland (32

percent), New Jersey and Connecticut (29 percent), Alaska (28 percent), New Hampshire (27 percent), Louisiana, Wyoming and Virginia (24 percent) and Texas (23 percent).
